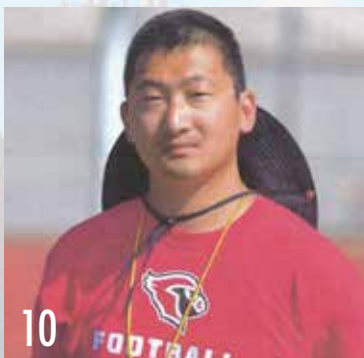

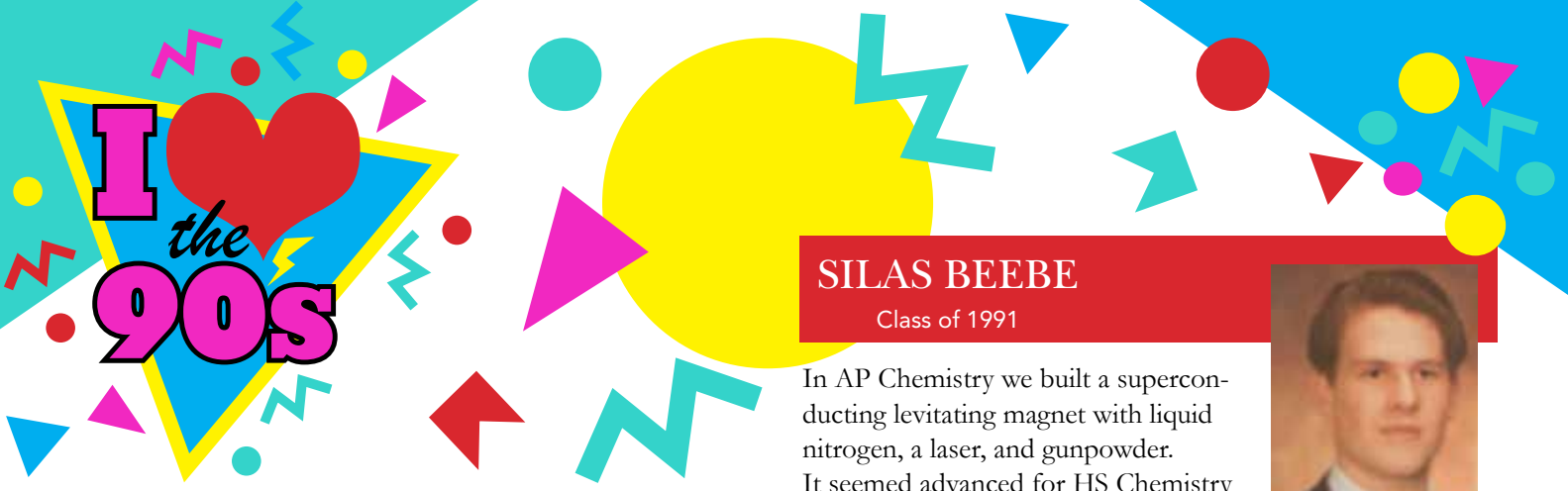

I also applied to a summer program in Egypt through Lincoln. There, I was able to take classes at the American University in Cairo

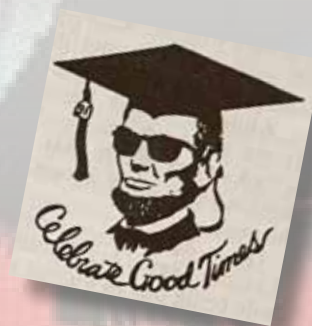
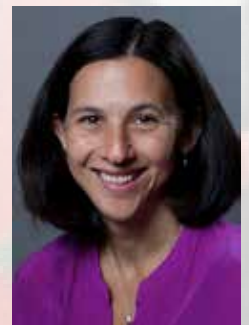

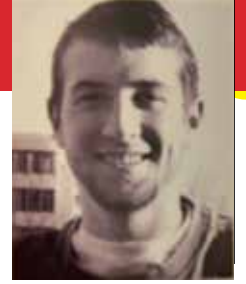

I really enjoyed my high school years. I love the teachers and the camaraderie of the students. I graduated in 1944, so the war was the backdrop to most of those years. I remember knitting socks and scarves for the Navy servicemen. I remember collecting scrap metal with the other students for the war effort. We collected so much that the entire school was awarded free tickets to go downtown and see a movie together - “The Major and the Minor”. I remember the school closing for the afternoon, all the metal lined up on the sidewalk out front.

One of my happiest memories is the time I was chosen to be the May Fete Princess for the high school prom. I was so surprised and excited that I’d been chosen. I remember my father exclaiming, “I had six girls... it’s about time one of them won something!”

I loved high school so much that I was almost sorry to leave. The only reason I felt good about graduating is that I was to take the train to New York City to visit my sister in New Jersey. I always intended to return to Oregon, but life has a funny way of undermining one’s plans. On that trip, I met the man I’d later marry, with

whom I’d start a business, build a house, and raise a family. New Jersey came to be the second place I’d call home, but Oregon always maintained its place in my heart.

Roberts coached the boys’ team at Yamhill-Carlton leading the 3A Tigers to win the state title. She became the first female coach in Oregon history to lead a boys’ team to a state title! Caruso thrilled to coach Cardinals

New Lincoln football coach feels at home despite congested offseason, late hire.

For coaches who are new to programs, such as Matt Caruso at Lincoln, the condensed offseason was especially challenging.

Hired as the Cardinals' head coach in mid-July to replace Jeremy Johnson, who is now head coach at Newberg, Caruso met with Lincoln's families for the first time on July 22, just before the mandated week at the end of July when coaches cannot have contact with athletes or families.

He made the best of the quiet week, taking care of logistics that are usually handled in the spring.

It helps that Caruso knows the Lincoln community well. In fact, he considers it the program he's been most connected with since moving to Portland from New Jersey in 2014 when his wife Catherine, was hired as a pediatrician at Doernbecher Children's Hospital. He spent the 2015, 2016 and 2017 seasons as the Cardinal's defensive coordinator. The connection he built with the Lincoln community never faded. Caruso said he kept all of his Lincoln gear in the hope that he'd be back at the Southwest Portland school.

After spending the strange 2020-21 season as an assistant coach at Milwaukie High, Caruso, who also previously was an assistant coach at Franklin, was considering a return to the Portland interscholastic League. When the Lincoln head coaching job opened, it was like coming home, he said.

"I've never felt the same about any other school I've been at," said Caruso.

Given the the timing of everything, Caruso calls the quality of assistant coaches on his staff "kind of miracle."

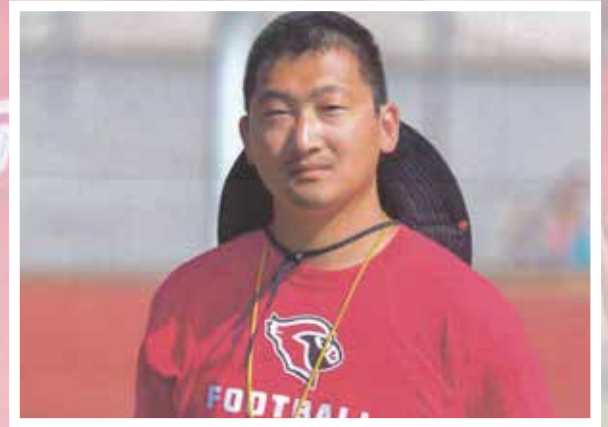
Austin Cheadle remains at Lincoln as the offensive coordinator. Matt Ryman, the throws coach for the Lincoln track and field program, is the defensive coordinator and will coach the defensive line.

The Cardinals went 5-1 in the spring, dropping only their opener to Jefferson. That squad had only five seniors, so the spring should be something to build upon for the 30 or so current upperclassmen who contributed to a productive spring.

As official practices began on August 16, Caruso was still learning about the Lincoln roster. One thing he was certain about: the Cardinals have size where it counts.

Seniors Tyler Smith (6-3, 260) and Riley Prince (6-1, 235) will play the guard positions for the Lincoln offensive line. Caruso described Smith and Prince as workhorses who love to get upfield and block.

With his staffing in place, the focus for Caruso is preparing a group of some 55 players to compete for a championship in the PIL.

LHSAA moved our Archive collection into the First United Methodist Church in August of 2018. We started sorting and organizing the material at Lincoln High School the summer of 2018. We hired Katie Bush who was working on her master's degree in public history, and Caitlyn Aldersea, Lincoln senior. Both worked long and hot hours to sort through years of yearbooks, Cardinal Times, athletic awards, historic photos, and the list goes on. The collections are now organized and stored in archivally safe boxes. We are working on entering the collections in a museum program called Past Perfect. Generations of Cards will be able to access and research Lincoln's rich history of over 150 years. The church has asked us to move so they can use the room for a ministry. Summer of 2022 we will be able to move into the new Lincoln building. So.... we have rented a brand new 10 x 20 climate-controlled storage room on Beaverton Hillsdale Hwy. The room is large enough so we will be able to set up one or two of our worktables and continue working on our collections! Many of our alumni have used our collection as a resource to locate family members or events from past years.

The Portland Red Guide

—Michael Munk

Michael Munk was born in Prague in 1934. He escaped the Nazi occupation of Czechoslovakia and came to Portland in 1939. He graduated from Hillside School, Lincoln High School, Reed College, and received an MA in political science from the University of Oregon. While a student, he worked as a casual longshoreman on the Portland docks, sold tickets at the Holladay Bowl's summer concerts, and drove a truck during wheat harvests in the Palouse. His political activity began in the 1950s, when he became a local opponent of nuclear testing as well as a promoter of a Portland concert by Paul Robeson. As vice president of the Young Democrats of Oregon in 1956, he failed to win their endorsement of US recognition of China and had also failed to prevent the firing of a philosophy professor by Reed College in 1954. In 1959, he was ordered to leave Oregon by the federal government, whose domination of

South Korea he witnessed as a member of the US Army.

After Michael's military service, he was the national affairs editor of the leftist New York news weekly, the National Guardian. After receiving his PhD in politics from New York University, he taught political science for more than twenty-five years at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, Roosevelt University in Chicago, and Rutgers University, before returning to Portland.

Since his return, Michael has published on local radical history and culture in the *Oregon Historical Quarterly*, the *Pacific Northwest Quarterly*, and *Science & Society*. His column, "Our Radical Past" was a monthly feature in the Portland Alliance for several years. Prior to *The Portland Red Guide*, his most recent articles include "John Reed: Political Provocateur" in Portland Monthly (September 2006) and "McCarthyism Laid to Rest?" in Reed Magazine (Spring 2006).

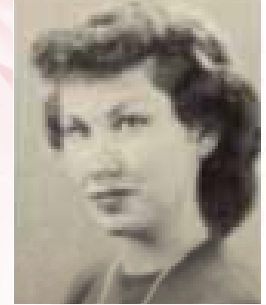
