# From the Principal

Dear LHS Alumni,

We are all moved into our new school at 1750 SW Salmon Street! Students have nicknamed the school "The New Nest" and they are busy creating art and other exhibits that make the spaces look and feel like school spaces. It's impossible to fully explain the joy and even wonder that students, staff and visitors have experienced when walking through our doors. Alumni visitors often tear up remembering their friends and siblings when they see the memorabilia so carefully displayed. Teachers feel physically cared for and supported in ways they have never felt supported as professionals. Our students have been wide eyed in wonder and appreciation. Luca, (24) said, "Ms. Chapman, this isn't just a school. It is art."

The supportive spaces impact all of our day to day experiences. On the first day back for students, LHS alum Robin Marks ('80), PIL Hall of Fame Track athlete as well as Portland's first Black Rose Festival Queen, joined us to welcome everyone in the new LHS Auditorium. Robin shared her love for her days at Lincoln and also shared that it "wasn't always easy". Her advice, "Take

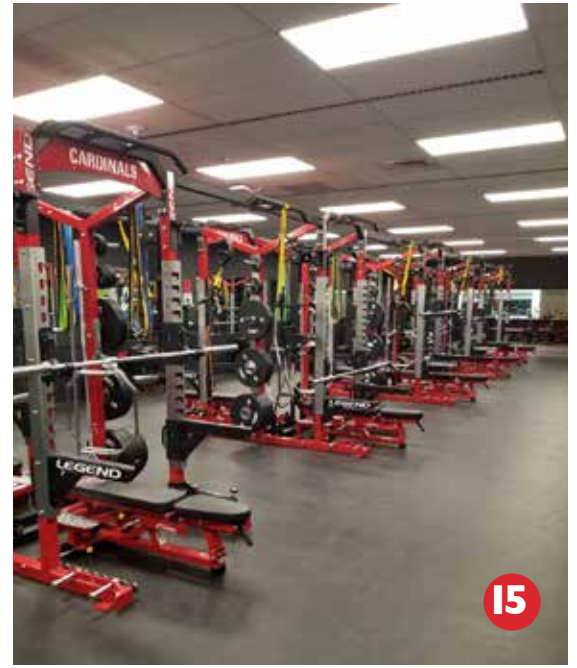

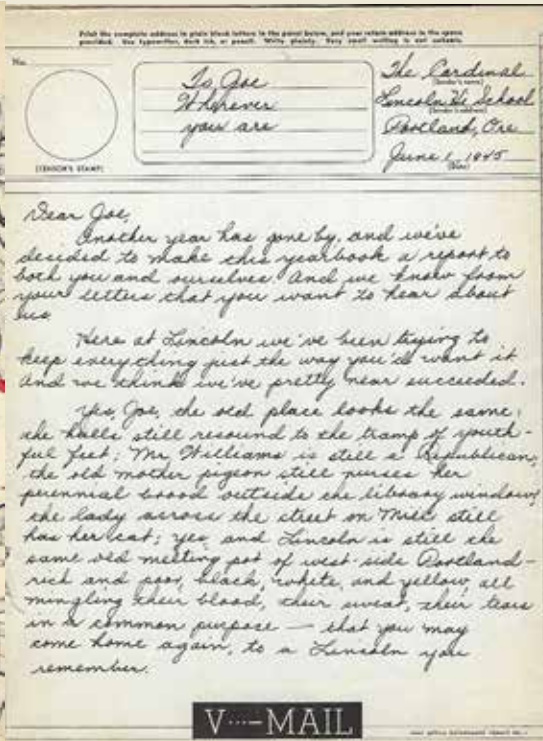

I always regretted losing the Lincoln. In 2019, I saw an ad for the sale of the very same Lincoln and was able to reacquire it - almost 50 years later.

# CLASS OF 1970 52nd REUNION

## August 5th & 6th, 2022



The Lincoln High School Class of 1970 held our 52nd Reunion on August 5th and 6th with a tour of the "new Lincoln" building and an evening of dinner and reconnection of classmates at the Stockpot Restaurant at Redtail Event Center.

Under a tent on the warm summer Saturday evening, the class caught up with each other's diverse lives, watched a slide show of vintage photos and enjoyed a buffet dinner. Class of 1970 Classmates, many of whom are 70 years old this year, enjoyed sharing memories of our time at Lincoln more than 50 years ago. Over 80 classmates attended this highlight of the reunion weekend. After half a century, the class spirit was strong, and a good time was had by all.

The Class of 1970 donated \$1,423.56 of class funds from the proceeds of previous reunions to the Lincoln High School Alumni Association to build capacity for organizing reunions for other Lincoln High School classes. 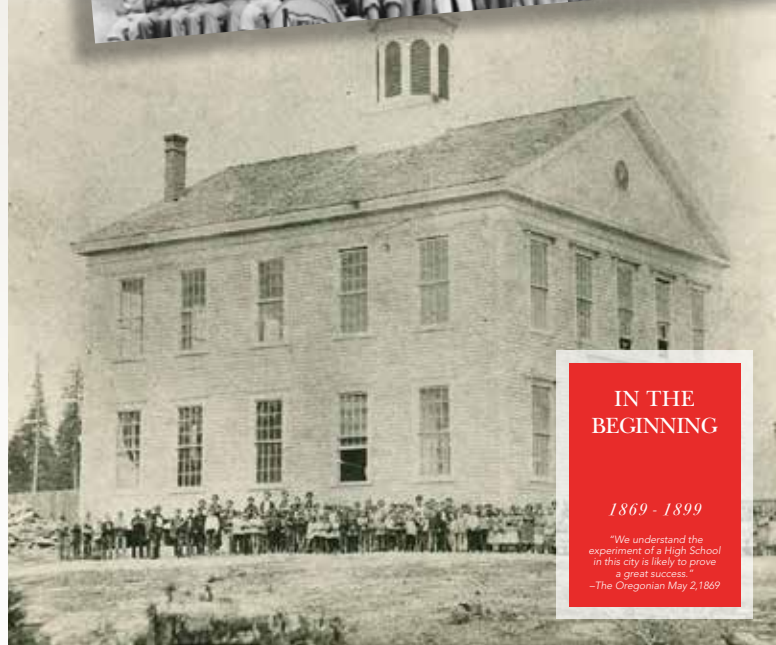

## 150 YEARS OF LINCOLN HIGH SCHOOL

*Preserving the Past - Inspiring the Future*



### IN THE BEGINNING

1869 - 1899

*"We understand the experiment of a High School in this city is likely to prove a great success."  
-The Oregonian May 2, 1869*

With the end of the Civil War in 1865, the trickle of settlers westward had swollen to flood tide. In 1869, the Golden Spike of the transcontinental railroad joined east and west. And in 1869, the frontier settlement of Portland, 9000 strong, was pushing back the forest from a clearing on the Willamette River. Public-spirited citizens, noting that only 734 of the more than 1700 children were in school, realized the need for a free public high school because up to this time all secondary education was handled by private schools.

With need came action. Midst much debate about costs, the first public high school in the Pacific Northwest, and one of the first west of the Rocky Mountains, opened its doors to 45 students and two teachers as Portland High School on April 26, 1869.

The Oregonian took note just one week later in an editorial: "We understand the experiment of a High School in this city is likely to prove a great success. It is popular among the scholars of the public schools and that is the best evidence of its usefulness."

Enrollment steadily grew as more elementary students passed oral and later written exams to enter the high school, and in 1875, Portlanders turned out in numbers as

I am a third generation Portland native, an endurance runner, speaker, sports trainer, dyslexia advocate, and author of *Running the Distance* – the story of how dyslexia prepared me for the World Marathon Challenge. All sale proceeds from the hard and soft cover are donated back to the International Dyslexia Association, with the audio book sale proceeds going to the local branch in my home state of Oregon. A portion of the funds raised during my World Marathon Challenge became the seed money for creating the IDA Oregon Branch's Running The Distance Scholarship to help students run their own distance in their post high school learning. I was diagnosed with dyslexia at age 5, long before there was any universal help in the classroom. Fortunately, with

the support of my family I was able to make it academically. In 2017, I decided to leave a career in collegiate football to use running as a platform for raising awareness and funds to help students just like me. I know the hardships students with learning challenges face and want to support future students, especially in my home state. I believe that starts with K-3 literacy. Science based reading and equity need to be at the forefront of our education system.

During her short stay in Japan, Luna witnessed first-hand the effects of climate change and decided to act upon and advocate for change. Luna founded the Effective Climate Action Project, where she was able to attend the Conference of Youth Climate Change Summit in November of 2021.

Luna was also the winner of the 2021 President's Environmental Youth Award. Luna became involved in the Lincoln High School Cross Country and Track programs where she took her talents as well.

According to her Coach, Eric Dettman, Luna not only was a competitor, but more importantly, Luna also supported her teammates and their successes.

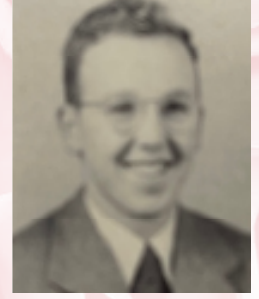

Judith Michie Yamouchi  
Class of 1956

Judith Michie (Sakurai) Yamauchi was born July 15, 1938 in Portland, Oregon at Emanuel Hospital, the last of six children by Chiyoko and Masaru Sakurai. Since her mother was induced one month early so that the doctor could go on vacation, Judy was quite small (5 lbs.) and slept most of her first year. When she was three years old, she and her family were sent to the Portland Assembly Center (Pacific International Livestock Exposition Pavilion) to be kept there until the permanent concentration camps could be set up in south-central Idaho. She spent ages 4 to 6 at the Minidoka Relocation Center in Hunt, Idaho.

After World War II was over, she and her family went back to Troutdale, Oregon to the family farm; but, due to prejudicial words and comments indicating that they weren't welcome there, decided to leave and sold the land. Judy's father started work as a landscape gardener and moved into the only place which would accept hers and many other Japanese-American families in Portland — the Federal Public Housing Administration's Vanport (the country's largest public housing project). After the 1948 Vanport Flood, the entire housing project was destroyed in less than a day and more than 18,000 residents were displaced. After her family was flooded

out of Vanport, they lived for a while in Fairview, and then in downtown Portland on 1st and Sherman St. where she attended Lincoln High School.

Judy attended Reed College, majoring in organic chemistry under Dr. Cronyn, and went to graduate school at the University of Oregon. At the U of O, she was recruited by Shell Development Corporation in Emeryville, California to work as a chemist in the patent section doing international literature searches because of her language abilities in German and French. Shortly thereafter she was sent by Shell to go back to graduate school at Stanford University to learn the Japanese language.

Hiroshi Yamauchi (originally from Maui, Hawaii) was living in the San Francisco Bay Area, working for the competing Ortho Chemical Company when he met and married Judy. After earning his PhD at UC Berkeley, he accepted a position at the University of Hawaii Manoa and he and Judy moved to Hawaii. Hiroshi remained a professor of Natural Resource Conservation Economics at the UH until his retirement 30 years later.

Hiroshi and Judy had one child, a daughter, Kara Mie, who was born in Honolulu. For a time, Judy was a stay-at-home mom. After her daughter was in school, Judy went to work as the Director of the Japan-America Society of Hawaii until the family went to Japan for Hiroshi's two Fulbright Fellowships, at Kyoto University and at Tokyo University. While in Japan, she worked for Suntory in Akasaka- Mitsuke, Tokyo.

# Remembering Neil Talbot Jumonville *October 7, 1952 – September 8, 2022*

Lecturer in History and Literature at Harvard University (1986-1990). But he spent the bulk of his professional career at Florida State University where he rose from Assistant to Full Professor (1990-2000). In 1999 he was named the William Warren Rogers Professor of History at FSU, and he chaired the History Department from 2002 to 2008. A much-loved classroom professor, Jumonville won teaching awards four separate years and was named Professor of the Year in 1995-96. Students will recall Neil's "Oprah Day" where he would lead lively discussions once a week on controversial issues.

Dr. Jumonville's main scholarship and publishing focused on mid-twentieth century American intellectuals as cultural critics: *Critical Crossings: The New York Intellectual in Postwar America* (Berkeley: University of California Press, 1991), and *Henry Steele Commager: Midcentury Liberalism and the History of the Present* (Chapel Hill: University of North Carolina Press, 1999). Moreover, Neil acted as editor and contributor to two other books—*The New York Intellectuals Reader* (New York: Routledge, 2007) and *Liberalism for a New Century* (co-edited with Kevin Mattson, Berkeley: University of California Press, 2007)—as well as contribut-

ing chapters to numerous books, journal articles, and shorter essays and reviews to journals and newspapers. Neil believed the role of the intellectual was to persuade readers, to defend important ideas, and to write for the public and the civic good. Poly-active in university affairs, whether through committees or Thursday Morning Basketball, Neil believed in serving his community. Family and friends will recall his commitment to hospitality, his sense of humor, and his sincere concern for others.

Neil was preceded in death by his mother Annette Ansley Jumonville, his father Jim Jumonville, and his brother Steve Jumonville. He is survived by sisters Penny Abrahamson and Anne Flaningam, and brothers Bill Jumonville and Robert Moore-Jumonville.

Neil Talbot Jumonville, Florida State University Professor of History, died at the age of 69 on September 8, 2022, in Tallahassee, Florida, after a more than eight-year battle with Alzheimer's.

The fourth child of Annette Ansley Jumonville and Jim (Urie) Jumonville, Neil was born in Portland, Oregon, October 7, 1952, graduating from Lincoln High School (Portland) in 1970. From there Neil went on to earn his bachelor's degree in Economic Thought from Reed College (1977), MA in History from Columbia University (1979), MA in History from Harvard University (1983), and PhD in History of American Civilization from Harvard University (1987).

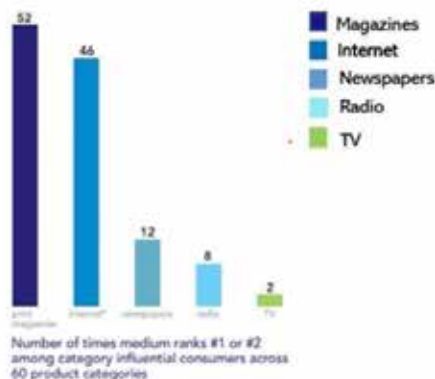
