"Good morning, Class of 2022. You are our honored guests. I am beyond grateful to be here, with all of you, in this 1952 classic, red & white, hand painted,

checkerboard Cardinal Coliseum. Remember when you were all freshmen in PE here together? You are the only class here right now who can remember an in person Senior Awards Assembly, as we haven't been able to hold one since your freshman year. That's an odd thing to think about. 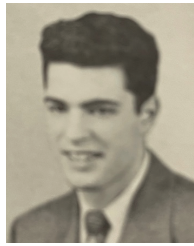

# ★ ★ LHS HALL OF HONOR 2022 ★ ★

## Bill Martel Class of 1951

Bill received the Lewis & Clark Lifetime Sport Achievement and Leadership Award. He spent 38 years coaching wrestling at high school and college levels.



Bill Martel, '51

In 1966 he was the Greco-Roman Assistant Coach for the USA wrestling team for the Olympic games in Atlanta. He was also a Junior World Team Head coach and twice the Head Coach of the World Cup Team.

Bill wrote the following in an email to LHSAA on May 2nd.

"I grew up in an Italian neighborhood on lower Broadway Drive. Attended Ainsworth School. Spent an ill-fated year at Hill Military Academy. Summer baseball and Wade Williams and Jim Partlow brought me back with my classmates to Lincoln via old Kamm field. During WWII the Kaiser shipyards brought workers from the south, many of whom were black and lived in Lincoln's jurisdiction. Our students came from Portland Heights, South Portland, North Portland and Williams Avenue.

We were integrated before anyone used the word. The two closest and lifelong friends were Don Foreman and George Sumino. Georges family spend the war years in an interment camp in Minindoka, Idaho. George's older brother was dilled in Italy, a member of the Neisi 442nd infantry division.

George was center on our football team and Donnie our best running back. Sports and coaches kept us in school. Donnie graduated from O.T.I. and George went to Lewis and Clark with me. I wanted recognition and Lincoln present opportunities. Sports of course but also Optimist Club, Letterman's Club, Choir, senior class play and student government. We picked our own class schedule. As memory serves me, I think Tom Coluosano was the only "counselor". I saw him once in my time at Lincoln at my request. Being on the student government my English teacher,

economic health to the poorest regions of the world in several signature areas, including: HIV care, disaster response, cancer care, and medical technology innovation. He received the Clifford Barger Mentoring Award, given annually to 5 of the 12,000 Harvard Medical School Faculty. He has published over 400 manuscripts and is a member of the Association of American Physicians.

Frances Elmer was our advisor. He kept me focused on my grades. Not high on my list at the time. My coaches, Jim Partlow, baseball, Jerry Frei, football kept telling me to go to college just to play ball. They knew how to motivate me and set higher sights. I followed their advice. Lincoln High School, and all that it was, pushed, directed, an Italian kid from lower Broadway Drive to open his eyes and see what there is to see. All the degrees, honor and recognition I have received have my name on them, but they are not mine, Wade Williams, Jim Partlow, Jerry Frei, Frances Elmer & Lincoln High School... they are ours".

## David Bangsberg Class of 1981

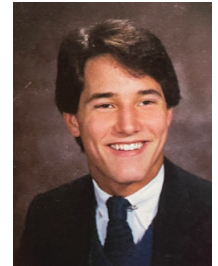
Founding Dean OHSU-PSU School of Public Health, former MGH/ Harvard Prof; Obsessive Sailor; PDX Bike Commuter David Bangsberg, MSc, MD, MPH is an Oregon native and the Founding Dean of the OHSU-PSU School of Public Health. He was previously a Professor at Harvard School of Medicine and the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. After completing a Masters Degree in Philosophy of Science from Kings College London and MD at Johns Hopkins. He completed his medical residency at Columbia Presbyterian Hospital in north Harlem to care for patients afflicted by urban poverty and HIV. Upon moving to the University of California, San Francisco and completing fellowships in infectious disease and AIDS prevention as well as Master's Degrees in Public Health from the University of California, Berkeley, he became the leading expert in HIV and homelessness. He then turned to sub-Saharan Africa to find that the poorest HIV-infected people in the world had some of the highest levels of HIV treatment adherence. His work was described by President Bill Clinton as the "nail in the coffin" on the debate as to whether HIV-infected people in sub-Saharan Africa would adhere to antiretroviral medications and neutralized the major criticism to providing multinational funding for global HIV treatment. As former Director of Massachusetts General Hospital Global Health, he brought together the expertise of Harvard and MIT to improve physical, mental, social and

## Todd Harris Class of 83

American sports announcer and reporter for NBC Sports and NBCSN, with current duties focused in Olympic and extreme sports

Alpine Skiing & Snowboarding Play-by-Play Announcer Todd Harris is the voice of NBC Sports Group's action sports, including the Dew Action Sports Tour, and recently completed his sixth Olympic assignment with NBC Sports as the play-by-play announcer for snowboarding. In addition, he served as the play-by-play announcer for alpine skiing during NBC's coverage of the PyeongChang 2018 Paralympic Winter Games and called play-by-play for the same events for five other Winter Olympics with NBC. During the PLL Championship Series, Harris served as the sideline reporter.

Harris began his career in sports broadcasting in 1991, initially covering surfing and snowboarding for ESPN. Harris later joined ABC Sports in July 1999 as a sideline reporter.

From 1999-2007, Harris worked as a sideline reporter on ABC's lead college football broadcast team covering the ABC game of the week in the PAC 10 in 2005. Harris called play-by-play for ESPNU, covering college football and basketball. He soon expanded that role, adding coverage of the X Games and Winter X Games and working as a pit reporter for IndyCar. In 2005, Harris was the play-by-play announcer for the IndyCar Series and called the IRL and as well as the Indy 500.

From 1998-2004, Harris covered the NBA Playoffs for Turner Sports. He also worked for Turner Sports at the 1998 Olympic Winter Games in Nagano, Japan, and the New York City Goodwill Games.

A 1990 graduate of Brigham Young University, Todd Harris has a bachelor's degree in Communications/Broadcast Journalism. He now resides in Utah, with his wife and their children.

#### Why he is an Amazing Educator:

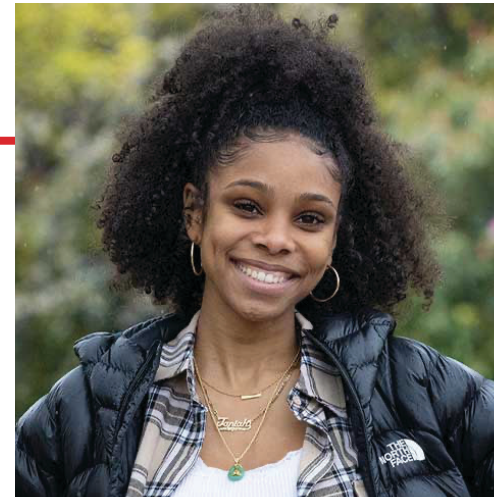
Bliss's passion for knowledge and dedication to students inspires them to think critically and make the world a better place.

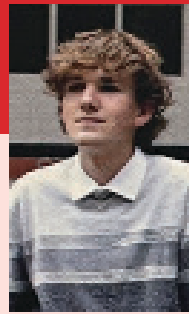

## **Shayan Shabani – Asa I. Arnsberg Scholarship**

Mr. Arnsberg graduated from LHS in 1927. This scholarship was established in 2018 by his daughter, Susan Arnsberg Diamond '57 and president of the Arnsberg Family Foundation and Robert L. Arnsberg '60 direction of the foundation board. This is for a student planning to attend a two or four year Oregon college.

## **Ike Salinsky – Cardinal STEM-Dickey Scholarship**

Lyle Dickey '47 was a skilled math and economics student and a national record holder in the pole vault. During his Navy career in the 1960's, Mr. Dickey worked on the first manned space capsule to the moon. In 2012, his cousin Sally Hathaway, '54 established this scholarship in his honor. It is awarded to a senior interested in science, technology, engineering, math or economics.

## **William Guo – Dr. Shirley Malcolm Scholarship**

Dr. Malcom taught English and Humanities at Lincoln for 15 years. She was a visionary teacher for four decades who brought creative thinking and new ideas to education, including creation of the district's first computerized writing lab and established the International Studies Center. This scholarship was established in 2014. It is presented to the student who exhibits the highest integrity, a love for learning, and a respect for all individuals.

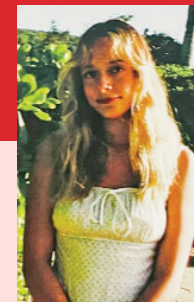

## **Luna Abadia – Bertha Hunter Language Scholarship LHSAA Leadership**

Miss Hunter began her career at Lincoln in 1923 and retired in 1952. She taught Latin, French, English, and mathematics. To honor Miss Hunter, Rex (Jim) Bates '41 established the Bertha Hunter Language Scholarship in 2007. The recipient is determined by the foreign language.

## **Cate Bikales – Bill Lynch Scholarship**

This scholarship was established by the Alumni Association in February 2020 to honor Mr. Lynch, an English teacher who died suddenly in September 2019. The scholarship to be awarded to a senior in need of financial assistance who also shows "an uncommon and authentic passion for the study of literature and philosophy"; the type of student Mr. Lynch inspired.

## **Magdalena Marban – Marie Allen Service Award**

Mrs. Allen served the Lincoln community for 27 years as a physical education teacher, coach and counselor. For more than two decades, she was also recognized state-wide for directing student government and school activities. A service award was established for the senior class upon her retirement in 1975. It is presented to a graduate who has given outstanding service.

### Gabrielle Kennedy – Resiliency Scholarship

This is our first year of awarding the LHSAA Resilience Scholarship and our first recipient was Gabi Kennedy. She graduated with a weighted 4.143 GPA and completed 18 IB courses (those are end of first semester stats and LHS has not published official transcripts as of this week. Gabi faced significant challenges with stunning resilience throughout her years at Lincoln. We are honored to have selected her for this award.

The Lincoln High School Alumni Association Scholarship Committee created this scholarship to acknowledge the resilience of students in their ability

to persevere under stressful circumstances. There are many students at Lincoln High School who have lived with – or are currently dealing with – significant issues that no high school student should ever have to face. We are talking about students who are attending Lincoln High School, so they are one of our own.

This scholarship is unique in so many ways and starts with a nomination process designed for the staff of the Lincoln High School. It focuses on two key questions: Why should this student be nominated for this scholarship? And, plans beyond high school. The completed nomination is redacted by the counselors to eliminate the release of any personal information as it is forwarded to the selection committee.

The sad reality is this population is much larger than most of us realize. The LHSAA Scholarship Selection Committee was amazed at the depth and number of nominations by the staff. Each and every one spoke volumes about the student’s resilience and determination.

The committee plans to continue this very worthwhile scholarship and award more than one award each year. We understand the need and -encouragement to the student body at large. That our Lincoln High School Community is there for each and every student trying to make their journey as successful as possible.

### MAF Athletic College Scholarship Program

#### LINCOLN ALUMNI GREG & PETER HOUSER SCHOLARSHIP

The Houser Scholarship program is for individuals who are energetic and confident examples of achievement through athletics in our community. This scholarship is a way for the Houser brothers, Greg and Peter, to give back and positively influence scholar athletes as they graduate from their alma mater.

Eligible student athletes that attend Lincoln High School can apply with no nomination required. The \$10,000 scholarship award is renewable for a second year upon meeting eligibility requirements. There is no restriction on the field of study and the scholarship can be applied at any 2 or 4 year accredited institution towards tuition, fees, books, or technology. Deadline for application is March 1st.

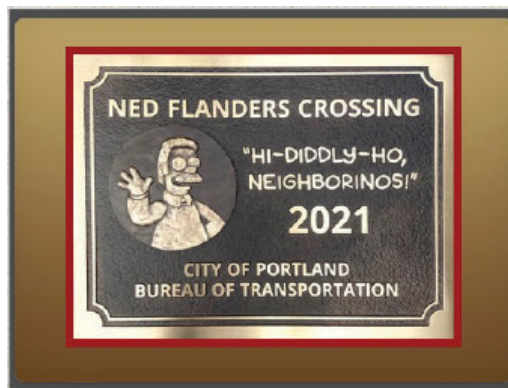
The Portland Interscholastic League has a rich tradition is sports excellence dating back to at least 1900.

# Jacob Kamm Property –Lincoln’s Home



Kamm was born on 12 December 1823, in Canton of Glarus, Switzerland.

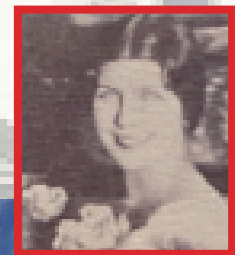
Kamm was a founder of the Oregon Steam Navigation

Company in 1879 and a shareholder in the Ilwaco Railway and Navigation Company. He built steamboats including in 1891, the Ocean Wave and in 1900, Athlon. One of the companies he owned was the Vancouver Transportation Company. His 1870s French Second Empire style home, the Jacob Kamm House was moved from its 14th and Main location in the 1950s to construct the current Lincoln High School. This estate property near 14th and Main contains 11 acres.

In 1984 the Kamm House Partnership – William Hawkins and Ron Emmerson bought the house. They

stated that the Kamm mansion is design in the French Second Empire. It is handsomely proportioned, clearly Portland’s singular remaining great mansion from the decade of the 1870s ... the most proper imitating stone construction in wood. It has no tower, but the mansard roof is a distinct attribute, probably the

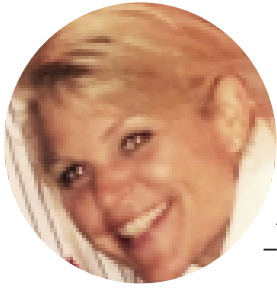

I now look at the new school building as a testament to the monumental impact Friends of Lincoln, LHSAA, and individual alumni foundations have provided to sustain the integrity of Lincoln's students.

Since attending the Senior Assembly, I have reflected on my experiences at Lincoln and what was the most significant thing that I gained from my time in high school. My moment to reflect was brief since my high school friends, and their families have been my lifeline over the last 30+ years, which has led me to the fortunate and wonderful life I have today.

Shortly after returning to Portland after college and living in San Francisco, Emmerling Studios hired me as a Textile Designer. The design experience I gained from working with Philip Emmerling was pivotal for me to network with lead architecture firms and interior designers. Since then, I have continued to work in design-oriented fields, from television advertising to creating art education presentations.

When Dana Cress founded the LHSAA Archives, I was immediately interested in seeing what was in the treasure trove since my cousins and I are third-generation Lincoln graduates. # Lincoln High School's *new building* on track to open fall 2022

Peyton Chapman has been the Principal at Lincoln High School for the past 15 years. She calls the multi-phase construction of the school a dream come true. A 2017 bond gave Portland Public Schools almost \$800 million to upgrade, rebuild and plan for future improvements. "The first day I walked into the building students were eating on the hall floor, our ceiling tiles were failing" Chapman said. "Just to see it come to fruition is really exciting." Lincoln was the smallest high school at one point and the most overcrowded with 1500 to 1700 students. The current cafeteria seats on 150 people because they've had to put temporary classrooms into the cafeteria space. But that is all changing, thanks to the "Health, Safety and Modernization Bond" passed by Portland voters in 2017. Construction on Lincoln started in January of 2019, and a new six-story building is now up on what used to be the school's track and football field. The vertical space for a small practice field and bigger classrooms. Erik Gerding, project manager for the new school said "we are on schedule to open this fall, 2022.

The new 292,000 SF high school is a six-story urban "high-rise" building designed to accommodate a surge in student population of Portland

Public Schools. The school is being constructed on the west end of the athletic fields. This allows students to occupy the current facility during construction;

stringent safety protocols and preconstruction planning were put in place to protect the students on the active campus. The new building includes specialized classroom for 2D and 3D fine arts, adjacent flex spaces, STEM labs and a maker space. The building will have a variety of sustainability features and innovative way finding to help students and staff navigate the "high rise" wing of the school. New athletic facilities will include a 1,700-seat main gym, an auxiliary gym, eight room, wrestling/dance room and a new track and field. Primary features will include a new commons and outdoor plaza at the main entrance; the team is working with Portland's Regional Arts and Culture Council on a large mural that would front the building. Also included are a new 500-seat auditorium, black box theatre, dedicated band and choir classrooms and associated practice rooms, along with a career technical education space.

Each person received a map of "What Was Where, When We Were There" and a "LHS Class of '70 Trivia Challenge." During introductions, each classmate shared a good memory from their time at Lincoln. It was a very special way to start the afternoon. Two people had fond memories of singing in the choir with Mr. Trogen in that very room. Others

talked about appreciating teachers who made an impact on their lives, making lifelong friends, having multiple generations of their family attend Lincoln, helping backstage with many of Mr. Lehman's productions, enjoying dances (including a very fun holiday dance where Mr. Bailey was Santa's Elf, Mr. Campbell was Santa, and Mrs. Allen was Santa's Helper) and reflecting on the importance of being a part of the very special Lincoln community.

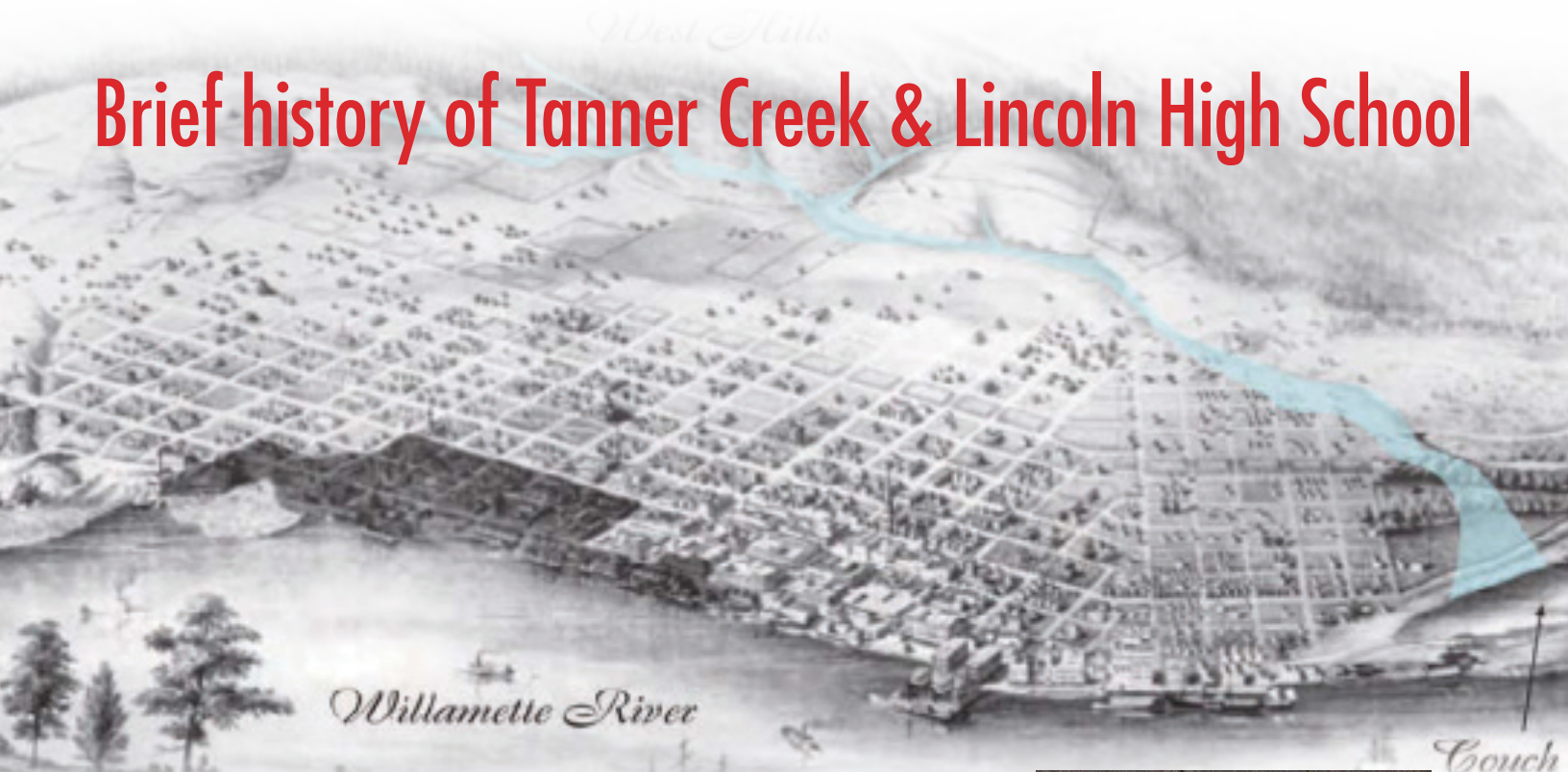

# Brief history of Tanner Creek & Lincoln High School



During a recent tour of the new building, Hoffman Construction superintendent explained one of the reasons for locating the new building near SW 18th was that Tanner Creek conduit runs under the old football field. These pipes prevented the NEW Lincoln from being located further east.

Tanner Creek is a small tributary of the Willamette River in Portland. Named after a tannery owned by one of the city's founders, it begins in what is now the Sylvan–Highlands neighborhood in the Tualatin Mountains (West Hills) west of downtown.

Daniel Lowndale, an early Portland settler and one of Portland's founders, built a tannery along the creek in 1845. The creek was named for the tannery.

Canyon Road, important to Portland's early development, was built along Tanner Creek canyon. First opened in 1849, the road connected Portland to the Tualatin Valley. Lowndale was the surveyor on an improved version, a plank road, two years

later, which began near the future site of the Portland Art Museum.

Couch Lake was named for John H. Couch, another early settler and one of the city's founders. Couch built a home on the west side of the lake.

In the 19th century the creek flowed on the surface, running northeast across the city, past what later became Providence Park and into a shallow lake (Couch Lake) and wetlands in what became the Pearl District, bordering the river.

Late in the century, the city began re-routing Tanner Creek and other West Hills streams into combined sewers and filling their former channels and basins to make flat land for homes and businesses. In the 21st century, Tanner Creek is nearly invisible, flowing through a conduit (but not a combined sewer) that empties into the Willamette at Outfall 11, near the Broadway Bridge. Structures along the former course of the creek include Vista Bridge and Tanner Springs Park as well as Providence Park.

In 2006, Environmental Services finished work on a new pipeline that removed Tanner Creek and the other West Hills streams from the combined sewer system and redirected the clean stream flow directly to the Willamette. The Tanner Creek project was part of Portland's 20-year program to control combined sewer overflows and it removes about 163-million gallons of water annually from the combined sewers.

The creek's headwaters lie in what is now the Sylvan–Highlands neighborhood in the Tualatin Mountains (West Hills) west of downtown. The creek flowed down the canyon that now accommodates Southwest Jefferson Street and Canyon Road (U.S. Highway 26). Its course continued across the site of the later Civic Stadium (Providence Park) and down a ravine. The ravine or gulch was up to 50 feet (15 m) deep in places and as wide in places as several city blocks. Vista Bridge in the Goose Hollow neighborhood crosses a

remnant of the Tanner Creek gulch. [Pavement markers near Providence Park indicate the creek's former course in that vicinity.]

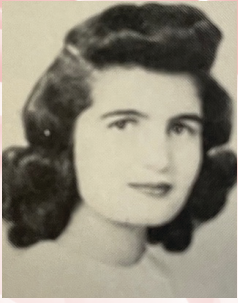
The creek emptied into Couch Lake, near today's Union Station. The lake, which no longer exists, was up to 15 feet (4.6 m) deep and covered 22 city blocks. In 1888, after the Northern Pacific Terminal Company bought the lake, it began filling it with sand and ship ballast.

Between 1887 and 1891, the City of Portland built a Tanner Creek combined sewer to carry the creek as well as storm runoff and sewage from the West Hills and its homes to the river. Constructed in three stages, the sewer, about 6 feet (1.8 m) in diameter, was at that time "one of the largest trunk sewers ever built by the city." In 1904, the sewer collapsed near the Multnomah Athletic Club and flooded property downhill. Investigation of the subsequent sewer reconstruction and repair led to a scandal during the administration of Mayor George Henry Williams and to the firing of the city engineer and chief deputy city engineer on grounds "that they had a part in a general conspiracy to slight the work." [The Tanner Creek trunk sewer ran from Southwest Taylor Street to the river near the intersection of Front Avenue and Pettygrove Street.]

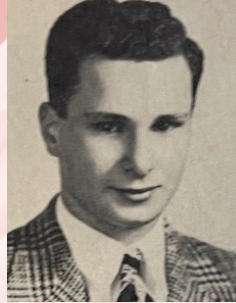

## LHS Principal Edwin Schneider | August 20, 1927 – April 16, 2022

Edwin Schneider, who died in April after a brief illness, was principal of Lincoln High School from 1962 until 1970, a decade of assassinations, social movements, protests, war, and the emergence of the “generation gap”). A much-admired educator and effective school leader, Mr. Schneider served Lincoln well during a time of national and local challenges. He leaves behind his wife of 74 years, Meredith Pauline (Paula) Schneider, and his extended family. He was preceded in death by his children Cathie McPherson, and Claude Schneider, his parents, and all his siblings.

Ed’s entire career was in public education. He was a teacher, high school principal, assistant superintendent in the Portland Public Schools, and adjunct instructor at Portland State University. Among his numerous appointments, Ed served on the national committee of the Merit Scholarship Program, the Oregon Teacher Standards and Practices Commission, and the Accreditation Committee of the National Association of Colleges.

He served two terms as President of the Portland Youth Philharmonic Orchestra, one of his most-beloved assignments.

Ed felt privileged to have known so many of his students, colleagues, school parents and members of the community whom he encountered and worked well with throughout his long life. Characteristically, he was a regular attendee at Lincoln class reunions until his final years.

Over 90 years of age and upon LHS’s 150th anniversary, Ed wrote: “To Lincoln High students, alumni, teachers, parents, and staff, congratulations on achieving the distinguished status of a sesquicentennial high school! It means you [we!] are among the few schools having helped so

many tens upon tens of thousands of people grow and develop capabilities so vital to their lives.”

In addition to education, Mr. Schneider had many interests and hobbies, including woodworking, flower gardening, traveling through Europe and the USA, and, of course, the Youth Philharmonic.

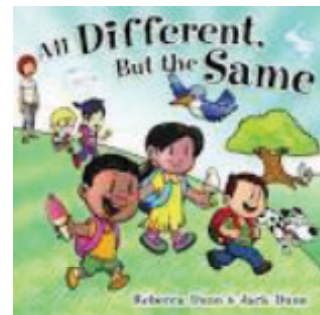
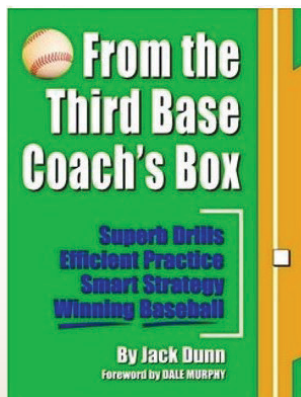

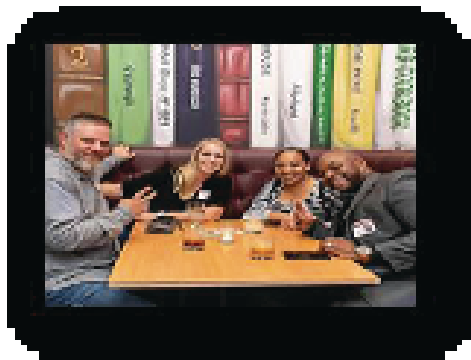
