From the Principal

Dear Lincoln High School Alumni, Happy Holidays to all who are celebrating this month! December is an exciting month with winter sports basketball games and swimming and wrestling meets starting this month. We also are incredibly please with the recent news of Lincoln's 2020-2021 sustained 95% four-year graduation rate despite the hardships during the pandemic. Our students developed resiliency and our seniors have already started to receive college acceptance to a long list of schools including Dartmouth, Stanford, Boston College, PSU, UO, OSU and others. We are working to help underclassmen prepare for IB classes and they are making friends and connections that will help carry them through the best and worst of times.

Work on the new Lincoln HS continues with great speed. The roofing and building mechanical (HVAC) equipment installation process is substantially complete. This progress set the stage for a major project milestone in November, and you may have noticed that the large North tower crane was dismantled and removed from the site. The interior work continues the first and second floor CTE, music and wrestling/dance spaces including wall finishes and acoustic ceiling installation. The Theater, Media Center, and Commons are all showing interior finishes, as well technology connections ready for the AV equipment. Network rooms are being prepared for gear installation and the building power was turned on last week. This is all very exciting progress. If you roamed the halls of Lincoln High School between the years of 1970-2001, it's more than likely that you ran into Mr. Morten or "Mort" in the classroom, on the tennis court, or in the pool. Mort dedicated his career to serving the Lincoln community and inspiring students to be independent, creative, curious, kind, and critical thinkers and he encouraged people to find joy, laughter, and fulfillment in every endeavor. For those that enrolled in photography, there was the ritual

of working in the darkroom to perfect prints along with the annual viewing of Citizen Kane. For those working on yearbook, there were many long days and late nights where the staff bonded over section layouts and hustled to beat print deadlines. For those in art and graphic design classes, there were many opportunities for students to think outside of the box and explore creativity in new and exciting ways. As the head coach for Lincoln swimming and tennis, his teams raked in 833 wins, 50 district championships with 11 runners-up, and three state championships with 12 runners-up; Mort also served as an assistant coach for football, wrestling, and soccer. One of Mort's coaching philosophies was to not cut athletes – if you came out for a sport and showed interest in learning and developing, you were on the team and a valued contributor. This approach gave countless students



the opportunity to try something new without fear of failure, allowed people to experience team camaraderie and develop new friendships, and gave many people a boost in self-confidence and pride. Over the years, Mort received multiple coaching accolades at the local, state, and national level.

After retiring from Lincoln, Mort returned to his childhood hometown of St. Helens, Oregon where he planted and actively manages a pear orchard on the family farm. Some of his other activities and hobbies include acting city council member, traveling, sailing, heading up to Mt. Hood for his 53rd year of ski instruction at Timberline, and spending time with family and friends as often as possible.

The LHSAA is pleased to announce that Doug Morten has been inducted into the LHSAA Hall of Honor for his countless contributions in the classroom and the many sports he coached. Thank you for all that you have done as a leader and motivator for thousands of students!

The Lincoln High School Endowment Needs Your Support

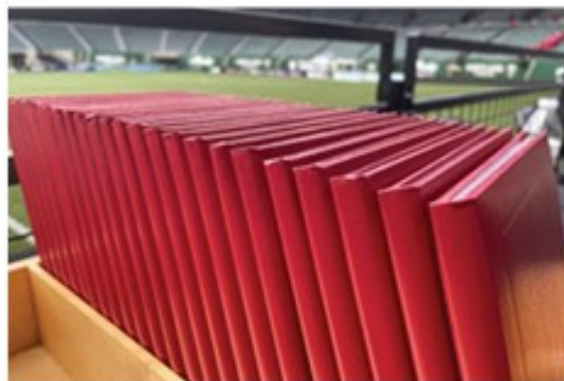

More MEMORIES from the 1950s

As my final year in grade school was drawing to an end Lincoln Vice-Principal Mildred Bassett made a visit to my 8th grade classroom to tell us what new classes, friendships we could expect. She was Chair of the Altar Guild at Trinity Episcopal Church, not far from Lincoln. Summer was soon upon us, and I enrolled in a two-week typing class at Lincoln and that was my first time inside the school building. Right after Labor Day, 1954, my freshman year began... my father drove me to the 14th Street side of the school every day. I took these basic classes: English; History; Algebra; Physical Education and 1st-year Spanish. Clara Settem was a gifted teacher of Spanish and I received top grades from her. Her classroom was on the second floor at the top of a small staircase. She mentioned that she had studied Spanish in Mexico. To this day I cherish the memory of my favorite teacher, Clara.

One day a week, after school, I took pipe organ lessons at 1st Methodist church in preparation for my duties as organist in my parish church. Organ practice was several afternoons after school at St. Stephen's Parish, near Lincoln. Of course, homework occupied much of my time with music and Spanish being my "first loves".

With more confidence than I had as a freshman, my sophomore year began with me learning to drive to Lincoln with my father sitting beside me. This year I took English; History; Geometry; Physical Education; 2nd-year Spanish, with top grades, again. C. Robert White, Lincoln's Band Director, wanted me to study bassoon in preparation for my Junior Year, and so I did. In summary, school at Lincoln with its rich historical past and truly outstanding faculty, especially Clara Settem, are my most vivid and poignant memories of my high school years.

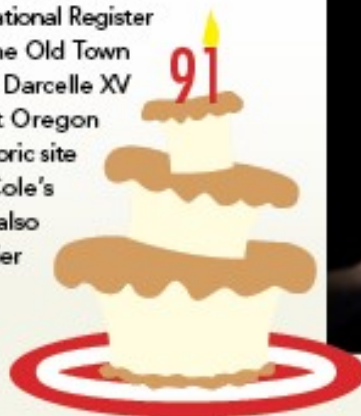

Walter Cole graduated from Lincoln in 1950. Darcelle, the World's Oldest Drag Queen, celebrated his 91st birthday on November 16th and the placement of Darcelle XV on the National Register of Historic Places. Cole opened the Old Town Portland club that would become Darcelle XV in 1967. Now that club is the first Oregon business designated a national historic site for its place in LGBTQ history. Cole's home in Northeast Portland was also named to the historic register earlier this year due to its architecture.

While the din of cheers and applause fade with time, memories of Lincoln's estimable teams and athletes linger. Our fields, court and track have been the scenes of laudable efforts and achievements - even greatness. The new school will duly celebrate this greatness by honoring our elite athletes, championship teams, coaches and donors. Contiguous with the multi-gym complex, students and visitors will discover an impressive display designed by BORA Architects that recognizes the "Legends" of Lincoln.

The construction of this recognition wall would not have been possible without the generous support of grateful alums and other supporters who have contributed \$250,000 to-date. With a goal of raising \$500,000, we need to encourage the generosity of additional donors. Importantly, a preponderance of these donations plus future gifts will fund endowment for Lincoln's teams and athletes. It is not widely understood that, were it not for donated funds beyond

what is budgeted by PPS for athletics, many underserved students would not be able to participate in sports and our teams would not have the necessary equipment and coaching to be competitive. This is possible because most of the physical display's cost is covered by not only proceeds from the 2018 school bond but additionally, a generous bequest to the Lincoln High School Alumni Association that will pay for a digital display and related software development, enabling access to

archival material related to Lincoln's "Legends."

Our fundraising is not yet complete. While the donor list will need to be formatted and printed within the next six months, there is still time to make a gift and honor or memorialize student-athlete sons and/or daughters, teams, teammates, Hall of Fame honorees or family members. Gift recognition will be as follows:

EMINENT OREGONIANS

Abigail Scott Duniway, **Richard Neuberger**, Jesse Applegate

Six years before a young John F. Kennedy made a similar trip, a 20-year-old Lincoln High School graduate from Portland boarded an ocean liner for Europe in 1933 to see firsthand what conditions were like for his Jewish relatives in Germany under its new chancellor, Adolf Hitler.

Richard L. "Dickie" Neuberger's harrowing report of anti-Semitic terror in "The New Germany" was published in *The Nation* and made the reputation of the aspiring journalist and future U.S. senator, whose writing had already appeared in *The Oregonian* by the time he was a sophomore at Lincoln. Within a year, he was writing for *The New York Times*.

Neuberger is one of three largely forgotten figures in Oregon history profiled in *Eminent Oregonians* (Stephen A. Forrester, 196 pages, \$24.85). The other two are early suffragist, newspaper founder and novelist Abigail Scott Duniway and Jesse Applegate, who blazed the Applegate Trail through Southern Oregon, staunchly opposed the extension of slavery to the territory, and stood up for Oregon's Indigenous peoples before becoming tarnished, perhaps unfairly, for his role in the Modoc War of 1872-73.

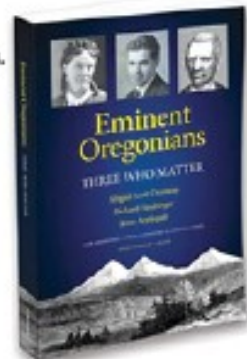

Neuberger's narrow election to the U.S. Senate in 1954 gave Democrats control of the upper chamber, making Lyndon Johnson majority leader and paving the way for much of the progressive legislation in Congress in the 1960s if not Johnson's path to the

He was an original co-sponsor of the National Wilderness Preservation Act that presaged Rachel Carson's *Silent Spring* and the environmental revolution of the 1970s although it wouldn't pass until four years after Neuberger's untimely death from cancer in 1960.

Eminent Oregonians co-author Steve Forrester discussed the legacy of Richard Neuberger with historian Chet Orloff (LHS Class of 1967). Noon Thursday, Nov. 4, 2021. The book is on sale now at Chapparral Books, the Oregon Historical Society and the Oregon Jewish Museum.



What made Applegate, Duniway and Neuberger "eminent" was they knew they had to convince their fellow Oregonians of ideas most did not yet believe—that new states should not perpetuate the sins of the old, that one half of the people mattered as much as the other, and that the new world that emerged from such beliefs would have to sustain life for that world to endure.

Pop-Cycles at the Beginning

The first Pop-Cycles was presented in 1948. I was an 8th grader that year and knowing that I would enroll in Lincoln the following fall, I attended the first-year performance. After that I was in the next four years, performing on guitar with my father, who also played guitar.

In the beginning the Dad's Club was heavily involved. The idea for the Pop-Cycles came from two dads who saw Pop-Cycles as a fund raiser to pay for driver's education. They were Julius Zell and Floyd Day, parents to Alan Zell (1949) and Doug Day (1951). Faculty involvement at the beginning included Miss Mertice Towne, drama, and Marjorie Albertson (music). Charles Boice and John Lehman succeeded Miss Towne while I was still in school.

Each year Pop Cycles had a theme. The 1949 theme, as per the photo above, was western. In my senior year of 1952 the theme was the south pacific, as indicated in the publicity photo from the Oregonian of my dad and the three lovely hula maids from my class. I'm not sure what a couple of folk singers came up with that year, but I suspect my dad might have thought of "Hapa Haole Honolulu Hula Girl" but which was probably considered bit risqué in that era, and politically incorrect in this.

I don't recall the other themes, however Alan Zell remembered singing "I'd love to get you on a slow boat to China" as a duet with his then steady girlfriend.

Pop Cycles continued to thrive until 1975 when there is no mention of the event in succeeding yearbooks. So it lived only in memory until Jim Peerenboom brought it back in 1999. Jim contacted some of the "old timers" to perform in the renewal, and yours truly was honored to be included. So I sang in two years of the "new" Pop Cycles, performing "The Big Rock Candy Mountain" and a couple others. Alan Zell was there as well to give a bit of the original history.

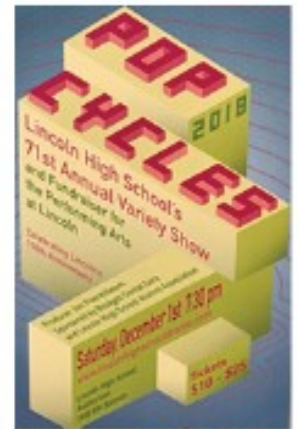

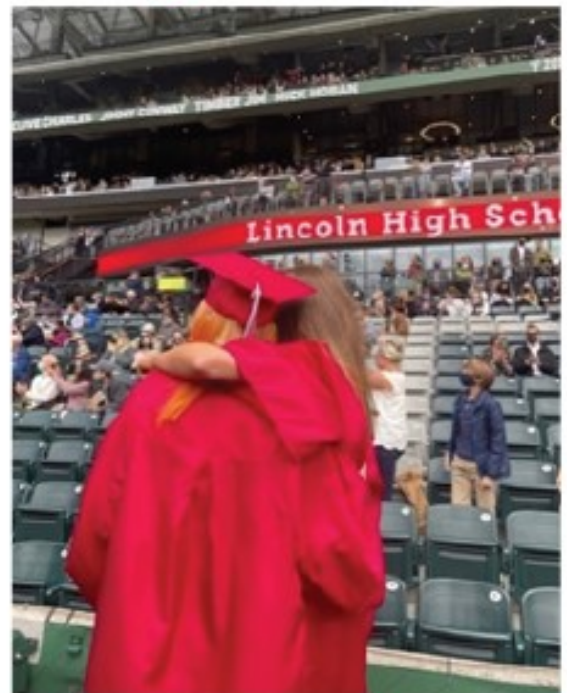

“The idea of reconnecting with someone who knew me when I was just starting out seemed like a powerful way to feel grounded,” says Dr. Masters, 63 years old, a clinical health psychologist in Denver.

Missing old friends? You're not alone. Pals from our past can give us a sense of stability in turbulent times.

Research shows that psychological distress often causes nostalgia. People tend to experience this sentimental longing for the past when they are feeling sad, lonely, anxious or disconnected, when life feels meaningless or uncertain.

“Covid represents a big sense of discontinuity in our lives. We've lost a

sense of who we are,” says Clay Routledge, a psychologist and professor of business at North Dakota State University, who has studied nostalgia for 20 years. “Recalling

cherished experiences from our past can remind us who we want to be, who we want to be around, and what we feel is important in life.”
